WOOD COUNTY HEAD START, INC.

Wood County Head Start (WCHS) is a non-profit, publicly funded program that has serviced Wood County for over 30 years. WCHS provided services to a total of 316 children during the course of the 2023-2024 program year.

WCHS offers three program options:

- Home-Based Program serving families with expectant moms/fathers and families with children under the age of 3;
- Infant/Toddler Program Center based serving children 6 weeks to 3 years;
- Preschool Program Center based serving children 3 to 5 years.

Program services are free of charge to families. Families who meet the criteria for acceptance, such as: Family incomes, receipt of public assistance, or have a child with special health care/disability needs, are those who receive priority for acceptance.

MISSION STATEMENT

To provide a head start to children and families, recognizing and respecting cultural and individual diversity. Head Start supports/promotes children and family growth and empowerment through education, parent involvement, and health awareness, integrating community resources.

Teaching children that learning can be fun and helping them feel good about themselves are key ingredients of the Head Start program. Children are given opportunities to learn and grow at their own pace. We provide an environment where children





FAMILY SERVICES/ PARENT INVOLVEMENT SERVICES:

- All families are offered the opportunities to participate with In-Home family monthly and weekly activities to enhance their child's learning experiences.
- Families can participate in Family Engagement Nights and Enrichment Days hosted by WCHS to enhance quality family time.
- Parent education experiences are offered on topics of interest, such as, Conscious Discipline, Nutrition, Budgeting, and Early Childhood Development.
- Parents are encouraged to participate on the Policy Council, the governance portion of the program.
- Family Service workers are available to provide one-on-one supportive services to families at the family's convenience.
- Parents are encouraged to visit the classrooms to get a better understanding of their child's educational experience.
- Parents are offered small group attachmentbased activities with infants/toddlers and preschoolers.
- Expectant parents are provided prenatal support and education.
- Individual or family meetings are available to discuss personal or family issues.
- Invitations to join children for lunch are periodically sent to families.
- Socialization experiences are provided for our Home-Based families.
- Family Services Workers have courtesy contacts to promote the continuation of relationships between Head Start and Families.



WOOD COUNTY HEAD START KINDERGARTEN PREPARATION AND TRANSITION:

- Collaborate with the local school districts to provide information and support to families around kindergarten registration.
- Teachers and Family Service Workers meet with families to discuss children's readiness for kindergarten.
- Teachers meet with and discuss with kindergarten teacher's developmentally appropriate expectations of children transitioning into kindergarten.
- At the end of the school year, teachers meet with kindergarten teachers from the various elementary schools to share relevant information about children transitioning into their programs.
- Children's Parent-Teacher Conferences and Portfolios are given to the families at the end of the school to share with their kindergarten teachers.
- The importance of parent involvement is stressed with families throughout their Head Start experience.
- Providing support to our non-English speaking families as well as other families who need help through the process of transitioning into kindergarten. This may include transportation, interpreters and any other additional support needed.
- Agency School Readiness data is analyzed and shared with staff and parents.
- Teachers will be intentional about providing activities and materials to meet children's individual School Readiness goals.
- Trainings related to increasing School Readiness outcomes are provided throughout the school year. These trainings may be done jointly with our local school districts.
- Teachers and Family Service Workers provide information, options and support to families with children who have Individual Education Plans when transitioning into kindergarten.
- For families transitioning to kindergarten, Teachers and Family Service Workers share transition information starting at the midyear Parent-Teacher conference and continue with transition information throughout the end of the school year.
